THE FRIENDS' CHRISTMAS PARTY





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CHRISTMAS DAY SERMON PREACHED BY THE DEAN

I am delighted you have come to Church today, and I wish you every blessing for this great Festival of Christmas. I greatly appreciate the tremendous efforts of everyone associated with the Cathedral throughout 2019: the Dean's Vicar, Canon Charles Mullen, for his conduct of daily worship, and his skilled and indefatigable production of service sheets, the Precentor, Canon Peter Campion, the members of the Cathedral Chapter, the Master of the Music, the Organist & Assistant Master of the Music, and the lay vicars and members of all the choirs for their superb, and indispensable, contribution to the worship at all times; the Cathedral Board and its sub-committees, the staff in the Offices, and in the Cathedral, the bell ringers and all volunteers including the stewards, and those who provide the tea and coffee following the Eucharist; the Friends of the Cathedral, and all who in any way continue to contribute so enthusiastically to the life of Saint Patrick's Cathedral. I thank you, and assure you of my deepest appreciation. As well as this, I wish to put on record my sincere thanks to all who have contributed to the Roof Appeal. The work is progressing extremely well, but, without your donations, it would not be possible: so, please accept my deepest gratitude.

'The Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us, (and we beheld his glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father,) full of grace and truth.' (St John 1: 14)

What we are remembering is the absolute, pivotal moment in history. It is the moment that God - immortal, invisible, he whose robe is the sky, and 'whose chariots of wrath the deep thunder clouds form' - stoops to embrace the world he has made, in all its pain, its hopes, tears, and dreams, and is born in human flesh.

And of course there are those who do not notice....

Two days ago, listening to a news programme on the car radio, I heard the results of a vox pop from people who were asked how they were coping with plans for Christmas. One man said, 'I haven't heard God mentioned once! I hear about turkey, and Christmas lunch, and bargains in high street stores, and when those stores open again after Christmas, but I haven't heard anything to do with the Christian faith,' he said.

No one much noticed, then, either, of course, on the night of Christ's Birth. The attention was focused elsewhere - at Herod's palace, at the temple, or wherever. Not at Bethlehem. Not a stable. So, who did notice? Well, Mary obviously, and Joseph - in confusion, and fear, in someone else's cattle shed, as it were; and some shepherds, again seized with mighty dread; and, if you believe the gorgeous but incredible rural tradition, perhaps the cattle who still, at least according to Thomas Hardy's poem, drop to their knees at midnight on Christmas Eve in honour of the master who once shared their strawy home.

Let's hold on, though. Is not this precisely how grace works? It comes to us, even though we are at times looking in the wrong direction. We are looking, quite understandably, at ourselves, or at one another. We are looking at our lives, we are wondering how we are to move forward, how we are to succeed, or survive, or start again. We are infinitely distracted. And yet grace comes anyway. In fact, grace comes because of all of that, because we need it as never before.

There are many signs of darkness in our world today, a time of upheaval and fear, as shown on television, and through social media: homelessness, human trafficking, the plight of migrants and refugees, the persecution of Christians and other minorities, the disregard for human life – including that of the unborn – and the general atmosphere of political uncertainty, not to mention the daily stresses and anxieties of life?

The reality is that into the fear, into the loneliness, into the darkness comes Christ. Did not the angel say to Mary, "Do not be afraid Mary, for you have found favour with God".

"What, me? I'm not even married. How can this work? How can this possibly work, Mary must have thought.

Well, because "nothing will be impossible with God." Nothing will be impossible with God.

So into the world comes Christ, not in triumph, like in the last verse of 'Lo! He comes with clouds descending,' but rather, 'how silently, how silently, the wondrous gift is given.' King David didn't get it either. He wanted to build God a palace. But what God wants is a tent. A Tabernacle. "Wherever I have moved about among all the people of Israel, I have been with you wherever you went."

God comes into a human being, into the womb of a young peasant girl from Palestine who is chosen to be the God bearer, reminding us always that we're not supposed to be ready, we're not supposed to be finished, we are supposed to say "how can this be?" How is it possible that God would come to me, I'm too weak, I'm too sad, I'm too sinful, I'm too tired and too lazy.

But that's only half the conversation. We are supposed, also, to be alert enough to try to hear the response "I have been with you wherever you went", for "nothing will be impossible with God." What a tremendous encouragement to us not only this Christmas Day, but every day: that God turns the values of the world upside down, and communicates with those whom others would so easily despise, and that God may remind us that He has been with us always, and always will, and that, no matter what our trials and difficulties in life, "nothing will be impossible with God."

So, let us take heart this Christmas Day, and every day. Emmanuel, 'God with us', is our divine gift, not only today, but for ever. So let us love him, serve him, and put all our trust in him.

'What shall I give him, poor as I am; if I were a shepherd, I would bring a lamb; If I were a wise man, I would do my part; yet what I can I give him, give my heart.'


ITALIAN VISITORS
