

## A SHOT FROM THE CANON

Thou also shalt light my candle: the Lord my God shall make my darkness to be light. (Psalm 18: 28)

February 2nd falls mid-way between the winter solstice and the spring equinox: it marks the gradual return of sunlight and warmth. Celtic rituals included the ceremonial lighting of fires to welcome this return, and the Church adopted these celebrations by blessing and lighting candles, giving us Candlemas as a celebration of Christ bringing the light of salvation and the warmth of love. Candle-light, though it can chase away the darkness, is fragile - somehow human. The delicate shift from winter to spring is a symbol of a human spiritual journey from darkness to light, from the ordinary to the sublime.

#### LENTEN REFLECTIONS

### Grant we may not faint nor fail.

Examining your inner feelings is fundamental to the practise of confessing. Like confessing, though, it's difficult and costly. It's not a question of making a list, but an honest attempt to find out why you've fallen short, or missed the mark. We Anglicans are accustomed to hearing about erring and straying, and of offending against God's holy laws. We're called to examine our conduct in the light of God's commandments that we, as penitents, may be restored to newness of life. We need to make time, and Lent is a golden opportunity to think on ourselves in the knowledge that our sins are purged away. Bless me, Father, for I have sinned...

# Strong with thee to suffer pain.

Having to say sorry to someone's face is difficult, costly, embarrassing even. When I make my confession at the Eucharist, or at Sunday Matins, I'm often left feeling that it hasn't been sufficiently costly. But when I've something on my mind that prompts me earnestly to seek God's forgiveness my confession feels the same as time spent in the dentist's chair. I know in my heart that confessing to God must be done in conjunction with making amends to those I've wronged – which in itself is difficult, costly, embarrassing – yet confessing to God lifts a burden. It has true value and genuine simplicity.

### Holier gladness ours shall be.

At baptism we're called to shine as lights in the world to the glory of God the Father. This calls us to magnify the light, rather than the darkness, yet we often fail to see the light because we don't trust fully in God's mercy and forgiveness, or we make ourselves feel that we don't deserve it, so why bother confessing? We find forgiveness only when we go looking for it. Sometimes it's easier to live amongst the shadows of shame and guilt, because the light might blind us and show us up. The light should draw us by dispelling our shadows, but this happens only when we keep our eyes fixed on God's mercy.

### So shall we have peace divine.

'Keeping it real' can often be a challenge to us who belong to the Church. I once heard an atheist claiming that there are two types of Christian: those who don't appear to believe, and those who are disfigured by their belief. I'm not sure where you or I fit, but I know that beauty isn't flawless: a real flower always trumps the plastic version because the former's beauty is fragile and fleeting. In the Gospel story the wheat and the weeds grow together. I'd prefer to concentrate my mind on the peace brought about by God's forgiveness, rather than on the turmoil of life without it. Plastic flowers, anyone?

### CHAPTER NEWS FROM THE CHAPTER CLERK

He will be succeeded here by the Revd Malcolm Kingston, rector of Armagh. The newly-elected and appointed have joined a disorderly queue for the ceremony of Installation.

### THE ADMINISTRATOR WRITES

As we continue through this prolonged period of lockdown it is important to reflect on the activities occurring within the wider cathedral organisation. Over the past few months every effort has been made to place the Cathedral in the strongest possible position to meet the challenges that lie ahead. Though the pathway to ultimate recovery is clearer than it was just a short time ago the timing of this recovery, and what form it will take, are still impossible to ascertain. The ongoing challenge of funding the roof work remains, and this has consumed a lot of our energies since March. We are confident that this challenge will be met. The recent grant from the Department of Heritage and Housing in the last days of 2020 was timely and welcome, as indeed is the continued stream of donations coming in from so many individuals, for which we are very grateful.

At times like these it is important to focus on the purpose of the organisation and so we endeavour to continue worship in whatever way we can given the circumstances we find ourselves in. We are aware too of the great need amongst those who live near the Cathedral, exacerbated by the pandemic. It is our intention to resume over the course of 2021 our community and outreach programs under the leadership of the Dean and the community officer, Kelley Bermingham.

Of course, so much depends on our ability to resume generating income at some stage over the course of 2021, continuing into 2022. Traditionally our income has come in the main from overseas tourism. There is little doubt that in the future this will continue to be the case. In the near term we must be more innovative and look to maximise those opportunities within our reach.

We expect the resumption of small scale events in 2021, particularly in the third quarter, followed by limited overseas travel within the European Union community of nations and the UK towards the end of the year. Only in 2022 are we likely to see a strong and sustained recovery in tourism. We will of course focus on the limited domestic market this summer. We continue to liaise very closely with Fáilte Ireland and other state bodies and marketing organisations to this end.

The marketing officer, Clarissa Delap, will resume her duties shortly and will work with me to ensure the relationships across the business tourism, inbound tour operators and event sectors are maintained and strengthened as we look towards recovery. We know that initially opportunities to generate income will be limited so we must be placed in the best possible position to ensure we access a significant share of what is available.

The recent lockdown once again stopped construction work across the state. The roof project paused for one week. However, with 70% of the slates missing from the roof, together with the associated guttering, pausing the roof works created a potentially emergency situation. Our temporary roof was designed to protect the structure and operatives during ongoing work, it was never designed to mothball the project for a prolonged period of time. We are acutely aware that, if water were now to penetrate the temporary roof, the results could be catastrophic. We have liaised with various government departments with a view to ensuring that the necessary elements of the project to secure the Cathedral from the weather continue, whilst all other work is paused until general construction commences again. At present the slating of the transepts and crossing continues.

The Cathedral staff and volunteers continue to display a high degree of professionalism though working under what can be, at times, difficult conditions. All of us here look forward to the brighter days that will come soon. Until then we endeavour to keep the Cathedral secure, the organization intact, the finances on track and everyone safe and well until we have the opportunity to meet face to face once again.

Grateful thanks and appreciation are also extended to our Organist and Assistant Master of the Music, Mr David Leigh, for his recitals on the Willis organ twice weekly. These recitals provide not only enjoyment through the music, but also enhance the spirit for those who are ill or self-isolating. Mr Leigh also very kindly plays the organ for the live streaming of the Sunday morning service.

Vital in the daily running of Saint Patrick's are Gavan, Louis, Ken and their wonderful teams in the Cathedral, and in the office. To all of them I offer my sincere thanks for their superb work. I know that during the course of the year, they, like all of us, will be pleased to welcome some of our staff back as conditions allow.

I am most appreciative of all that is being done to provide worship over this time of lockdown. As the signs of restrictions being lifted become more encouraging, I long for the day, hopefully in the near future, when we shall be able to open our doors again to worshippers and visitors alike.

Until we can meet again in person, please keep safe and well.

Becoming a Cathedral Chorister opens a world of exciting performing opportunities including regular broadcasts, concerts, recordings & tours.

The choristers are educated at the Cathedral Choir School (a Co-educational National School) which is renowned for the excellence of its teaching staff, and for its friendliness: small classes mean a real focus and care for each child. It is also unique in being the only choir school in the country, as well as being the oldest school in Ireland.

Saint Patrick's Cathedral Choir School was founded in 1432 by Archbishop Richard Talbot to provide for the education of the choristers and was originally housed in what is now the robing room of the Cathedral.

The Cathedral Choir School has had an almost continuous history since its foundation, the two interruptions being the Reformation and Cromwell's Commonwealth.

Nearly 600 years on, the choir school continues to educate the choristers and is now a two-teacher, co-educational school under the patronage of the Church of Ireland providing education to pupils from third to sixth class.

Admission into the Choir School is via a voice trial/audition (a very simple one to determine vocal potential, we normally get them to sing something very simple like "Twinkle little star") and an informal chat with the parents and Principal if they show the potential to be a Cathedral Chorister and these are open to boys & girls currently in the 2nd year. Whilst they would usually start in the Choir in the September of 3rd class, it is possible to start at other times depending on places available. Auditions are available throughout the year, and the staff are always happy to meet prospective parents informally, especially if they would like guidance about their child's potential for a Choristership.

During the last few years, the choristers have performed regularly live on TV and Radio, in front of VIPs including the President and His Holiness The Pope, on the stage of Gaiety Theatre and the National Concert Hall with both the RTÉ Symphony and Concert Orchestras, have toured extensively and recorded 5 critically acclaimed commercial CDs the most recent of which was released in 2020.
