

MRS. NORAH WALKER There was a large congregation representing a wide circle of friends at Mrs. Walker's funeral which took place in the cathedral on Wednesday, 13th January. The service was conducted by Canon Bradley, with the choristers under the direction of Mr. Dexter. The Dean gave the address. The burial took place in Coolock Churchyard.

By the wish of her family, her funeral took the form of a Scrvice of Thanksgiving. In his address the Dean spoke of her long life which had been full of achievement and fulfilment. She had been a keen sportswoman and good tennis-player and swimmer and had been Ladies Captain of the Island Golf Club. She had been a member of the cathedral and a regular worshipper since 1925. For many years she came on her bicycle every Saturday morning to clean and polish the communion rails and brasses. She represented St. Patrick's on the Diocesan Synod from 1956 to 1991. She had been in the cathedral at Easter and again, for the last time, in June. The Dean also spoke of the rich family life which she had made for her three sons after the early death of her husband. We offer our sympathy to Garry, Raymond and Colin, their wives and families. In spite of the sadness which bereavement must bring, they can commend their mother into God's keeping with truly thankful hearts.

FRIENDS This is the month for apologies. First a sincere apology to Mr. Andrew Johnstone. Unfortunately his name was omitted from the list of performers at our December Concert. This was an oversight on my part, and quite unintentional. Those of you who attended the concert will know that he was very much in evidence, and without his help, the musical items would have been quite impossible. Next with regard to the programme, I was a little premature on my announcements for March and April. While we do hope to have David Norris to speak to us at some time in the future, we have not as yet confirmed any date. On Wednesday 10th March the cathedral archivist, Roy Byrne, will give a talk on "The Alternative St. Patrick's".

On Saturday, 20th February, we have arranged a re-union with the Friends of Christ Church Cathedral. This will take the form of a special Service in the Lady Chapel at 3.00 p.m. followed by a conducted tour of the cathedral, after which they will be entertained to light refreshments in the Assembly Hall. We hope many of our Friends, especially those were on the trip to Chester, will come along and renew some acquaintances. N.T.B.

THE ADMINISTRATOR WRITES

As we draw to the close of the year, I want to update you all on a new initiative we are undertaking here in the Cathedral. The question of climate change and sustainability is in everyone's mind now, but the Church has long identified this as the defining challenge of our time. Here at Saint Patrick's, we understand that this is a difficult moral and ethical issue for the west, particularly in terms of the developing world and their legitimate desire to attain a standard of living equivalent to our own, a standard of living we enjoy largely through the exploitation of fossil fuels.

Nonetheless, as part of our strategic planning process, the decision has been made to develop a sustainability plan for the Cathedral and to lead by example, not only regarding the Church but also the tourism sector too.

To this end we are looking to gain gold accreditation through the sustainable tourism programme which we feel will help get the message out that we take this issue seriously. Within the EU the tourism sector is committed to reducing our combined carbon emissions by 50% by 2030 and becoming carbon neutral by 2050 at the latest. As the sense of urgency gathers pace, we can expect these targets to be revised and to become more even ambitious.

We will begin by measuring our impact in terms of habitat degradation, waste, water use and carbon emissions. The next step it to look at ways to reduce our consumption generally and to look at offsetting the carbon that we cannot eliminate. We are working with Bord na Móna to develop an accredited carbon offsetting scheme here for the Irish tourist industry to this end.

To this end we are looking to gain gold accreditation through the sustainable None of this will be easy. We will need to consider the impact of everything we do through the lens of sustainability, whether that be conservation works to the Cathedral, heating, lighting, packaging, or travel. We must also acknowledge the fact that our principal funding model is based on international air travel. We need to develop ways to engage our visitors to become part of the sustainability solution rather than let them become part of the problem.

None of this will be easy and it will take time, however the organisation is committed to lessening our negative impact on the wider world. I look forward to keeping you all informed on our journey towards sustainability in the months to come.

COMMUNITY NEWS

The Collaboration Award from Charities Institute landed in the post only today! It was awarded back in 2020 but no harm to share it and mention that the work continues. Most recent developments include:

- a successful Halloween open air event with no bonfire, no anti-social behaviour and no intimidation of any kind;
- completion of the upgrade to the surface of the football pitch.
- resurfacing of Cathedral Lane including the installation of sloping dishes to make pavements accessible for all including those with mobility issues and prams / buggies.
- completion of the design phase of the mural proposed for the wall on Cathedral Lane.
- design proposal of the new fitness and calisthenic equipment.
- trees on New Street Gardens side fitted with a new resin base.
- Waste management vigilance with DCC Litter Warden monitoring.



Community Officer, Kelley Bermingham continues to support local residents, especially the most vulnerable by linking them with the Dublin Care & Repair Team. This team is a SICAP (Social Inclusion and Community Activation Programme) funded initiative through the Ballyfermot and Chapelizod Partnership. A number of supervised and Garda vetted Tús workers support residents by clearing gardens, repairing railings, painting and general maintenance. One resident has been living in the area 30 years and is a wheelchair user. Her home has been painted inside and out (with donated paint sourced through the Cathedral), garden cleared at rear with overgrown ivy removed, and collected by DCC waste management team. This has made a remarkable difference for the lady in question, supporting her to enjoy her home space especially when things are so challenging and restricted socially.

The statue of Jesus in Cathedral View Walk has had the railings and wall painted, and we are seeking to replace the perspex cover that sits over the statue which was established as a tribute more than 30 years ago when a young man living locally died tragically. His mother still lives in an adjacent property and sadly her husband died during the early part of this year. He would usually maintain the area, but had been unwell and unable to do the work himself.

Rebuilding the trust and relationships with local residents is essential to the success, and were most unfortunate that Covid interrupted the significant progress that had been made. We look forward to working on more events in 2022 subject to the lifting of restrictions, and to continue the work that has taken place over the last 4+ years.

Other community news:

Membership and active participation in the PPN (public participation network) as LCDC (Local Community Development Committee) community representative. Part of the Community Enhancement Programme funding subcommittee and commencing work on the LECP (Local Economic and Community Plan). The LCDC is chaired by Cllr Carolyn Moore with participation from representatives across the city. There are 850 member organisations across the city in a variety of sectors. Gavan Woods, Administrator has recently been elected to the Strategic Planning Committee of the PPN and has been described as 'a breath of fresh air' by another committee member! The 5 year strategy is in development and we look forward to seeing how this shapes up.

Membership of the CORN (Community Organisations and Residents Network) in Dublin 8 and on the steering committee. Meetings are held monthly with 49 member organisations and a guest speaker. Meetings are structured, with sub-groups and working on the elements that make sense to community.

Membership of the Child and family Support Network for Dublin South Central (a Tusla led network) focused on the lives of families in the city area. Part of a sub-group focused on strategies for supporting the mental health of young people. We formed specifically to address the alarmingly high rate of suicidal ideation and self-harm in young men and women in Dublin 8. The highest rate in the country has been reported in this area! A video will be released shortly featuring organisations who work with young people in the area including Saint Patrick's Cathedral.

The CRiTiCall project (Community Response Team Call) initiated by the

Cathedral and run in partnership with Dublin City Volunteer Centre to benefit women and children who experience domestic abuse has been an enormous success in an especially challenging year. The continuation of the work was made possible by the Iveagh Trust as one of the major partners and contributors to the efficacy of the response. The estimated value of the phase one response is around half a million euro, and as we move into the new year, phase two is in the planning for a symposium. As a result of links with the Mother's Union throughout the pandemic, Kelley has been invited to give the address at a service on December 2nd in Christ Church Cathedral at 11.15 as part of the 16 days of action.
