She was his everything and although we were very important we were the satellites that revolved around her. A gentle soul his strength showed through like the fierce waves of the ocean that he loved so much. The valiant fight he gave this last year was incredible. He knew once he stopped walking he'd be stuck in a wheelchair so walking he kept doing even though at times it took him an age to cross the room. Slowly and methodically was his way, time and rushing were not part of his vocabulary. There will never be anyone quite like our dad, the man of Aran, the epitome of Love.

Matt was truly one of life's gentlemen. He had a stubborn streak (which he reserved for any suggested change to his beloved shed and garage) and a wonderfully wicked sense of humour. He was meticulous in all he did, with a wisdom that often defied logic. I well remember spending an afternoon attempting to move a double bed up the winding stairs in Landscape Park. Those of us chosen (ordered by Hazel) to assist, kept arguing that it would never fit, Matt would smile and assure us it was possible, and it was, with a

millimetre either side!!

For Matt, life was an adventure, to be lived and experienced to the full, whether driving around his beloved Dublin exploring 'shortcuts' or travelling to Canada, Australia, Portugal and many other places. His love of swimming was part of this adventurous spirit, whether in Lanzarote with pounding six foot waves, or on Bronte Beach. Getting Matt out of the water was never easy, he always stayed much longer than anyone else. He was very much a family man, and loved nothing more than having all the family together; But he really only ever had eyes for Hazel. Theirs is one of the great love stories. They met at a dance, and Matt asked if he could see Hazel again. She told him she was going on holidays for a couple of weeks. When she got back to Dublin Airport, there was Matt waiting for her...and the rest is history.

Matt loved Church, both in St. Anne's and more recently in St. Patrick's Cathedral. The music, the ambiance, the singing, the worship, the history of this sacred place moved him. He loved that his son Ivan and grandsons sang in the choir, he loved the chats and the craic before, during and after services.

How fitting, with the kind permission of the Dean and Chapter, that his funeral service was held within its hallowed walls and mending roof. All of us who knew and loved Matt will miss him terribly, he was a gentle giant among us.



THE DEAN WRITES...

I'm sure many will agree that, while under the present restrictions regarding Covid-19, it is not possible to have a congregation physically present for worship in Saint Patrick's Cathedral, what is most reassuring and comforting is the way in which we have been able to continue services on live stream. This creates stability in these difficult times, as it does structure, and reminds us that God is ever present in our midst.

I have been reflecting on this, and on the sheer majesty of God, in these 'darker' days, and I wanted to bring to you some comforting thoughts related to music, the vital role of music in worship, and our understanding of God whom we worship, love and serve.

Johann Sebastian Bach was a deeply religious man. His music is often considered to possess a 'mathematical' quality in terms of structure of composition, but there is as well a certain symbolism and imagery to be discovered within it.

In 1739, the third book of Bach's (1685-1750) Clavierübung was published. Consisting of 27 pieces of organ music, starting with a grand Prelude in Eb major, and ending with an equally grand Fugue in the same key, known as the Prelude & Fugue in Eb major, BWV 552, the entire book is considered Bach's most significant and extensive work for organ. It contains some of his most musically complex and technically demanding compositions for that instrument.

There is not the slightest doubt that, with regard to his Prelude & Fugue in Eb major, BWV 552, Bach aimed, quite intentionally, to convey matters of belief about the Christian faith through how he composed his music. The work is

firmly believed to reflect the Doctrine of the Trinity, of thinking about God in three ways – Father, Son and Holy Spirit. We speak of Three Persons in one God. Hence the number, 3, is significant. The key signature is Eb major – 3 flats – and the Prelude, just like the Fugue, is in three themes, which symbolise the Trinity, sometimes overlapping, which commentators have interpreted as representing the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, in the Trinity. Each theme is closely linked to the other two. The prelude consists of 205 bars, from which can ensue, symbolically, the number 7 (2+0+5). From the outset, with this perfect figure, symbol of the totality of space and time (7 days of the week, 7 notes of the scale, 7 words of Christ on the cross, etc.), God rested on the seventh day, and hallowed it, and we are to forgive others 70 times 7, Bach opens this collection with a glorification of the perfection of God.

The Fugue in Eb major is also rich in symbolism in respect of what we believe about the Holy Trinity. For a start, the triple fugue is a symbol of the Three Persons of the Holy Trinity. The same theme recurs in three connected fugues, but each time with another personality. The first fugue is calm and majestic, with an absolutely uniform movement throughout; in the second the theme seems to be disguised, and is only occasionally recognisable in its true shape, as if to suggest the divine assumption of an earthly form; in the third, it is transformed into rushing semiquavers as if the Pentecostal wind was coming roaring from heaven.

The number of bars in each fugue is divisible by 3: 36, 45, 36. Total 117. The factors of 117 are 13x3x3 which could represent the Unity of the Trinity. And taking the above numbers separately and adding them up: 3+6+4+5+3+6=27, and 27 equals 3x3x3, which is yet another reference, musically, to the Holy Trinity.

The Prelude & Fugue in Eb major, BWV 552, by J. S. Bach, featured in Mr David Leigh's greatly appreciated series of recitals on the Willis organ, on Trinity Monday, appropriately! As well as that, these works have been played from time to time by either the Master of the Music, Mr Stuart Nicholson, or David, as concluding voluntaries after divine service.

Let us thank God for the glorious gift of music, for the way in which music and singing 'make' our offering truly worship, and for the magnificent contribution of the members of our Music Department.

So, in response, when you get a chance, take a few moments, and listen to a recording of J. S. Bach's Prelude and Fugue in Eb major, BWV 552, and, as you listen, reflect on the marvel of Bach, and the majesty of God.

COMMUNITY NEWS

News hot off the press is that the Charities Institute, of which Saint Patrick's Cathedral is a member, has been awarded the inaugural Collaboration Award to a project very close to the hearts of the Cathedral and the local community. The award is supported by Doggett Ireland. Saint Patrick's Cathedral and the Cabbage Garden Interagency Group have worked closely with key stakeholders including: Dublin City Council, RADE (Recovery Through Arts Drama and Education) An Garda Síochána, 61st Merchants Quay Scouts, YMCA Dublin, local residents, Iveagh Celtic FC, local schools, local businesses and so many more community partners tackling local issues, area improvements, and working together for the better. The Cabbage Garden Park used to be a part of the Cathedral lands and was used as a cemetery in the time of the Huguenots from 1666 up to the 1900s. Over the past few years we have worked to create events that bring life and positivism to the space making it a great addition to the local area.









This work is continuing despite the current pandemic. The partnership have tailored all activities to what is possible within the parameters set out by the authorities to ensure safety for all concerned. Saint Patrick's Cathedral is maintaining it's presence in the project and will support it in any feasible way until we return to some semblance of normality.


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ROOF UPDATE

Work begins on the reinstatement of the Nave Clerestory windows.




While the roof contractors continue their works in the attic space above, protection is in place to monuments below.
