

OBITUARY - MR RONALD (RONNIE) MILNE

It is only now and again that one encounters in life a person of the calibre of the late Ronald Milne. Like his dear wife, Emily, Ronald was a gentle soul, always kind, and ever welcoming and friendly. He and Emily loved to attend worship in the Cathedral, and an abiding memory for many must be that of them greeting, and being greeted by, their friends — members of the congregation, and staff alike - and offering them a little gift, perhaps a packet of cough sweets, on a cold day.

It was with deep sadness that we heard of Ron's illness, and subsequent death in Tallaght Hospital; and our thoughts and prayers are with Emily who was admitted to the same hospital a few days after Ron, and was with him when he died. May the Lord bring Emily comfort, strength and peace in her bereavement and loss.

Ronald was born into a farming family at Willowbank, Enniskerry, County Wicklow, and later attended school there. After the family came to live in Dublin, the young Ronald attended Christ Church Cathedral National School, and later The High School, Dublin. Some time later, the family moved back to Wicklow, this time to Bray where Ronald made many lasting friendships which he nurtured with a couple of close friends throughout his entire life, one of whom, retired Church of Ireland rector, Canon Derrick Tyney, who lives now in Bangor, County Down, was bestman at the wedding of Ronald and Emily in Saint Werburgh's Church in Dublin.

That deep sense of friendship, and care for others, characterised Ron and Emily throughout their married life. It was a case of putting their firm faith into action. One very real indication of social outreach is gleaned from Ron's involvement as a member of the Order of Freemasons for 54 years – until his


retirement last year – and of his tireless and dedicated work in helping to deliver food parcels. Many have spoken of Ron's kindness, and of his thoughtful concern for others in every area of his life, and not least in the workplace. His last job before retiring was as a security officer in Leinster House, the home of the Oireachtas.

As we remember Ron today, we give thanks for his life, for his great love for God, for the years of married life which he and Emily shared, for his active faith, for his kindness, goodness, friendship, his gentle, humble and unassuming nature, and for his caring spirit. We shall miss Ronald greatly. He and Emily were so faithful in their attendance at worship in Saint Patrick's, and also by their generosity to the cathedral, not least in supporting our roof project, progress on which they were always keen to hear about.

We offer our deepest condolences to Emily today, to Ron's brother Ken, sisters in law, Esther and Gwen, nieces and nephews, and his many friends. For Ron, life has changed, not ended. We say farewell to him, but only in the earthly sense: we are confident of 'that joyful reunion in the heavenly places' with Ronald and with all our loved ones.

May Ronald rest in peace and be raised in glory.

THE DEAN WRITES...

When I received a kind invitation recently to visit the roof works of the Cathedral, I did not need any coercion to accept. I have enjoyed all my previous experiences of ascending once again what is believed to be the largest free standing volume of scaffolding in Europe – and this time was no exception. Far from it.

Having put on the protective boots, the 'high viz' jacket, the gloves, the safety glasses, and the tin hat, I was delighted to have, as fellow 'mountaineers', Gavan, our administrator, and George Good, chairman of the Finance Committee. There was a distinct sense of anticipation, achievement, and, importantly, gratitude for the marvellous progress which has been made, despite the first lockdown earlier this year, and the handicap of not having any income from tourism for basically all of 2020.

Lorcan and Alex, two members of staff of Clancy, our contractors, were our guides. Their knowledge of the work, down to the most minute detail, really impressed me. That was not all, however. What struck me forcibly was their total contentment in their respective roles; they were happy in what they were doing, and they felt honoured to be working on such an historic church of tremendous history and significance. Alex, who is from Moldova, has been in Ireland since 2007. He told me that when he came here first, he had not a word of English. Now he speaks it with fluency.

I believe, as we approach the end of what has been a very difficult year for Saint Patrick's Cathedral, that there are lessons to be learned from this: that, even with challenges, through sheer effort and determination, they can be overcome, and with a sense of contentment and achievement. To me, that sounds like a good agenda for 2021.

On our visit we were able to observe the re-slating of the south transept, the crossing, and the north transept all in one stretch, as one of the photographs in Close News aptly shows. There was a new vista from where we were standing, a different one to that from ground level. Looking at the re-slating from above meant we were able to put the whole project into context, and not just observe, or focus, on one part of it. Perhaps, in preparation for 2021, we need to adopt similar vision, by focusing on extended horizons, viewing beyond the end of the roofing initiative.

It was fascinating to learn that, in the process of re-slating, it is important to work at any one time on the two sides of the roof. To re-slate one side, have stripped the other side of the old slates, would be dangerous, we were told. There would be an imbalance – to the extent of the roof collapsing. It is essential to balance each side of the roof so that equilibrium of the structure is maintained.

Is not this true in life as well? Happenings and events can be allowed to shatter our equilibrium, and grossly alter our perspective. We have endured a devastating year through loss of income, through the Cathedral having to close its doors to worshippers and visitors, and it has been challenging in the extreme. Of that there is not the slightest doubt. We have lost; but we will find. I am confident that will be the case, not least through the marvelous news of the availability of the vaccine against Covid-19, which will mean, hopefully, the resumption of international flights, and the return of worshippers and visitors. It is necessary sometimes to look beyond the present crisis to brighter days ahead.

That does not mean that we do not need to tread carefully and with stealth. On our visit it was interesting to see the new walkways which have been created in the roof space, and which are an improvement on what was there before. This means that in these relatively unexplored and vast areas of the Cathedral, access now is secure and safe; there is firm footing. As we prepare for 2021, it would be good to embark on it with a degree of security, and step along a well-trodden and safe path as we discern our journey.

That's not to say that it won't be necessary to take a risk at times; after all, we take risks every day of our lives – like crossing the road safely, negotiating a journey without having an accident, not slipping on the pavement. Those are different, however, from asking for trouble, and taking risks which are clearly dangerous.

To conclude on a humorous note, Gavan was reminding us on our roof visit of a story which the late Charlie Reede, for many years Captain of the Tower, and authority on the bells of Saint Patrick's. When he was a schoolboy, a group of pupils was brought by the schoolmaster up through the tower of the cathedral, right up to the base of the spire. At a point during the visit, it was suddenly noticed that a young boy was standing on the protruding water spout on one elevation of the tower, at that level. The late Charlie said that the boy had done this for a dare, and for the promise of a sixpence if he was successful! That was dangerous in the extreme.

Having come back down to ground level, not exactly with a bump (!), but with the benefit of heartening insights into the ongoing success of the roof project, I think the lessons for all of us are these: to work at challenges, and, in so doing, find contentment; to look for the 'bigger picture', the renewed vista; to keep a sense of balance, and perspective, in life; to make sure our steps are secure; and, finally, only to take 'sensible' risks.

By these ways, the future might just become that little bit brighter in a brand new year.

Before that, though, I wish you a safe, healthy, balanced and risk free 'Christmas with a difference' this year!

THE ADMINISTRATOR WRITES...

The effects of the pandemic are well know to us all, with particular groups of people proving more susceptible and vulnerable to the virus than others. First and foremost Covid-19 is a threat to life and wellbeing and the Cathedral fully supports all the efforts taken by the state to minimise and contain the negative impact of the disease on our communities. Some sectors of the economy are similarly effected more or less by the pandemic, with tourism and events one of the most seriously disrupted of all. As a result the impact to the Cathedral has been profound. Our services have only been available over the internet for large parts of the year with just small congregations permitted within the building at other periods. We have had no visitors, or very few, since March which has made matters financially challenging for us as an organisation. Very sadly we have had to make some roles here redundant and take other severe measures to reduce our variable costs. Many of our numerous and deeply committed volunteers have likewise been unable to enter the Cathedral and undertake their highly valued work.

There have been some small wins, however. The roof project, critical to the future safety and security of the Cathedral, resumed after an initial lockdown period of seven weeks and the lack of visitors since has allowed us to progress necessary work within the Cathedral without interruption. Donations for the roof continue to arrive in on an almost daily basis for which we are very grateful. To date the Dean's fundraising appeal has raised the wonderful total of €1.5m. We will explore ways of increasing this amount in the coming months.


Despite many challenges we have continued to provide choral worship throughout the pandemic and we have taken the opportunity to improve many of our policies and procedures too, including those relating to governance and child safety. A fully worked through concept for a new visitor centre together with a robust business plan has been developed which we will progress when conditions allow and we have also improved our visitor facilities, including the provision of new downloadable Cathedral tours in multiple languages, which will be indispensable when we come to welcoming visitors back in numbers.

I am delighted to report the ongoing work to incorporate the Cathedral Board is progressing well, with the incorporation bill, which Dean Morton presented, having been passed by Synod. This amendment to the constitution creates a clear pathway to the formation of a new charitable company, so necessary to the organisation as we face the challenges ahead.

As I write this report in early December the news has begun to take on a more positive tone than has been usual over the past year. We at last have hope that our lives can return to something closer to normal in the not to distant future. For me, in the midst of the challenges which have abounded over the year, the flexibility, sacrifices and goodwill of the cathedral staff, the music department, management, visitor services, administration and vergers, has been a constant support throughout the crisis and is deeply appreciated.



A large number of families took part and it was a great way for everyone, especially those that are new to the school, to get that sense of community that we are so proud of at the Grammar School.






THE DEAN'S GIFT DAY
