THE DEAN WRITES

Saturday 20th August 2022 marked, to the very day, the 125th anniversary of the first ringing of the original ten bells donated to the Cathedral tower by Edward Guinness, Lord Iveagh. Incidentally, they are believed to be the 10th heaviest peal of bells in the world.

The occasion was made all the more special by the fact that the anniversary occurred during National Heritage Week, when over the two Saturdays which bookended the week, tours of the ringing chamber were completely booked out. It was fitting that the historic moment was marked by the presence of members of the public who were invited into the tower to watch, and to learn from the Cathedral ringers the art of bell ringing, which is, of course, an important part of the rich heritage of the Cathedral.



The Dean, who welcomed all present, said it was most encouraging to see the degree of interest shown in this ancient art, particularly among young people.




He thanked the Cathedral ringers for their tremendous commitment, faithfulness and support in ringing on Sundays, and also in attending the weekly practices. Dean Morton wished a speedy recovery to the Captain of the Tower, Mr Derek McEndoo, who had suffered a bad fall, causing damage to his elbow, thus unfortunately rendering him unable to ring for the next few months. Derek's wife, Kathleen, kindly offered to bring to Derek the good wishes of all in attendance for a speedy recovery.

Records reveal that the condition of the bells deteriorated during the 1880s, to the extent that the ringing of bells became irregular. In fact, by 1890, the ringers considered that only five of the bells could be rung safely.

As Dr Kerry Houston points out in his chapter, 'Restoration and Consolidation: Music, 1865-1977', in 'Saint Patrick's Cathedral, Dublin: A History', Dean Henry Jellett responded to this and formed a committee in 1896 to 'consider the present condition and take steps to provide a new peal of bells'. Lord Iveagh then offered to have the bells examined, which was promptly followed by his hugely generous offer to provide a new peal of bells for the Cathedral. As Dr Houston writes: "The peal consisted of a ring of ten bells in C with an additional B flat bell for use in chiming. The contract for this new peal was placed with Taylor's of Loughborough the following year and the service of dedication of the new peal took place on 20 August 1897."



Richard Cherry, who later became Chief Justice of Ireland in 1913, was elected president of the society of amateur change ringers. He had also been the instructor but had to step down from these duties due to increasing professional demands. Gabriel Lindoff was appointed instructor in his stead, a post he held for the ensuing forty years. Two additional bells were donated by Richard Cherry in 1909 which made 'twelve bell' ringing possible at Saint Patrick's for the first time. Dr Houston further points out that, " a further treble bell was presented by Lady Seeds Kay in 1925 making possible a ring of ten bells in F."



The anniversary, on 20 August 2022, was further marked by the ringing of eight of the ten bells for a period of seven to eight minutes, after which Dean Morton brought the proceedings to a close with the following prayer: "Grant, O Lord, that all who shall minister to thy service by the ringing of these bells may be filled with all reverence and Godly fear, and, ever mindful of the sacredness of Thy House, may put away from them all wandering thoughts, and continuing in holiness of life, may at the last stand with those who praise Thee evermore in the heavenly Jerusalem; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen."

NEWS FROM THE MUSIC DEPARTMENT

After a lengthy break from touring because of the Pandemic, it was wonderful to finally be jetting off once again with the Cathedral Choir on tour. This summer it was the turn of the Cathedral Girls' Choir who were invited to participate in the Diocesan Jubilee Celebrations held in the magnificent UNESCO World Heritage Site that is Roskilde Cathedral in Denmark.

Our singers joined their voices with those of the Roskilde Cathedral Girls' Choir to perform 2 pieces, one a Te Deum written for them by Danish composer Merete Kuhlmann and the other a setting of Psalm 96 (O sing unto the Lord) composed by a former organ scholar of ours, Jack Oades at a special concert in the Cathedral. In addition to these, both choirs performed a set of their own including, for our part, arrangements of Saint Patrick's Breastplate, Down by the Salley Gardens and a beautiful setting of an old Gaelic Blessing by Michael Higgins.

We then joined forces with all 4 of Roskilde's Cathedral Choirs, some 90+ voices, for a Jubilee Service attended by the Queen of Denmark who was also celebrating her own Jubilee, albeit (numerically at least) a much smaller one. Protocol demands that no one may have their back to the Queen which meant that the singers couldn't remain in their usual spot in the chancel and instead had to sing from the lofty balconies that ran from one end of the Cathedral to the other, and quite a sight, and sound, it was!

The trip was a huge success, superb singing, wonderful weather and very welcoming hosts who we look forward to welcoming on home soil some point soon. None of this of course could have happened without the support of the Cathedral Community, so a big thank you to all of you who supported our 2022 Sponsor a Chorister campaign, as always your generosity was very much appreciated.

Past Lives

On Monday 15 August, Cathedral Board member and Chairman of the Friends of the Cathedral Albert Fenton gave a fascinated audience delightful insight into the many monuments of Saint Patrick's Cathedral. From the intricacies of the Boyle Monument to Swift's stone-carved reproving assessment of The Duke of Schomberg, Mr Fenton took a deep dive into the thoughts and processes behind the creation of such marvellous work and placed them in the context of the Cathedral's history. Works on paper were presented, too, and those who were unaware of Harry Clarke's illustrative creations for the Irish Memorial Records were astounded by fine art's presence at the home of Saint Patrick's epic story in Ireland. Overall, attendees were amazed and amused, and there was a general sense of wonder as the audience felt even more connected to the Cathedral than before.





THE ADMINISTRATOR WRITES

This year we undertook a qualitative study of our visitors. Our staff have gathered over a thousand responses and we hope to have the interim report very soon. This information will be vital to us as we plan ahead and consider pricing and improvements to the visitor offer for 2023 and beyond. Such data has proved central to securing grant support in the past for projects like the audio guides, which have proved to be such a success with our international visitors.

We are commencing various works which have been delayed due to covid, including the Dean's gift day projects. This year we intend to place the current west doors in storage and replace them with new doors, one of which will contain a pass door to allow easier access to our external toilets. We also plan to significantly upgrade the live streaming service through which so many attend our choral services. Particularly ambitious is the proposed project to conserve and repurpose the Deanery mews as a centre for community and education activities. This will bring a rather neglected part of the Deanery back into use and safeguard the mews, which is only partly used and somewhat dilapidated, for the future.

We continue our drive towards sustainability with a sustainability policy due to come before the Cathedral Board in the near future for adoption. This policy contains many ambitious targets focusing on reducing waste and carbon emissions and increasing biodiversity. As a prelude to this we are measuring our carbon emissions across our operation, including those which accrue to us through our visitor operations, so we can understand where the challenges lie and how best we can tackle them.

Sustainability is a core topic contained within our strategic plan and is now central to our approach to all our activities. Our strategic plan is available to view in the governance section of our website should you wish to learn more.

Finally I would like to welcome Clark Brydon, our new education officer and volunteer coordinator. He has hit the ground running and we wish him well in the years ahead. The post of community officer remains unfilled and we hope to recruit for this position in the autumn.
