CONDOLENCES- TERESA NOLAN

The death, on 3 November 2023, of Theresa Nolan left ringers in Dublin shocked and saddened. Theresa had been ringing for the morning service at St Patrick's Cathedral the previous Sunday.

Theresa grew up in rural East Galway in the West of Ireland. After leaving school she started work in hospitality, training first in Ballinasloe and then in Lucerne. Later she ventured overseas to work and live in Sweden and the Netherlands. After many years working in hospitality, Theresa found time to graduate from Trinity College Dublin, having studied Irish, history and law.

Theresa then spent many years working as an Usher in the Houses of the Oireachtas, listening to parliamentary debates and getting to know members of the government and those that sat on the opposition benches. Her work included ensuring when the voting bell stopped the doors were locked and no member arriving late was allowed into the chamber to cast a vote. Theresa often spoke of the human side of politicians and maybe told a story of a small act of kindness performed by a politician who perhaps wasn't well liked by members of the general public. Theresa always saw the humanity in people. Theresa was rightly very proud of her time spent in public service.

At the start of the 21st century Theresa was living in the Iveagh Trust Apartments. The Iveagh Trust, one of Dublin's oldest and best known housing associations, was established in 1890 by Sir Edward Cecil Guinness. The same

Edward Guinness that was responsible for installing 10 bells in St Patrick's Cathedral in 1897. So it was fitting that in 2001 Theresa made her way up the tower at St Patrick's where she was taught to ring by the late Charlie Reede and joined the morning band at both St Patrick's and St Audoen's. Theresa enjoyed many ringing trips, especially one to Italy.

She still regularly went over to the West to check on the family home and once a year attended the Galway races with family members. We all knew if the Galway races were on Theresa would be missing from her normal place on the treble bell at St Audoen's but apart from her annual trip to the races and holidays back to Lucerne or Stockholm, she rarely missed a Sunday morning ring in St Audoen's or St Patrick's.

Theresa touched people in an understated way. Although living in the heart of Dublin City, Theresa found ways to keep a connection with nature. She spoke regularly about her work in the community garden. She gathered blackberries in Autumn and many a ringer enjoyed a pot of Theresa's jam with their morning toast. She was known to gather sloes at home or in Milltown and to celebrate her friends' birthdays with homemade sloe gin.

When COVID hit and put a stop to our ringing, Theresa feared she would never ring again. However with a little encouragement, when socially distanced church services resumed, Theresa returned to ringing at St Audoen's. Social distancing meant we could only ring 3 bells and through 2020 & 2021, as we went in and out of lockdown, whenever permitted Theresa along with Kenneth Morgan and Derek McEndoo donned their face masks and kept the

bells of St Audoen's ringing. She returned to ringing at St Patrick's early in 2022 and continued to ring up to the week of her death.

Theresa's passing leaves a gap in our circle that will be harTheresa's passing leaves a gap in our circle that will be hard to fill. Living in the shadow of St Patrick's Cathedral and just down the hill from St Audoen's she was always one of the first to arrive on a Sunday morning and first to volunteer when extra ringing was needed for weddings, funerals and special occasions. Theresa was the kind of ringer that is the backbone of many a belfry. A more loyal and dedicated ringer would be hard to find. She was known as a friendly, chatty woman who welcomed new ringers and was always happy to give up her bell to visitors, saying sure I'm happy to sit and listen.

On the day of her funeral, her family asked her bellringing friends to form a guard of honour as her coffin entered the church. 23 ringers stood in silence either side of the porch as the sound of handbells welcomed Theresa as she started her final journey back home to her native Galway.

CANON MULLEN'S ADVENT RESCUE KIT

Dear, struggling Advent, the season that offers much inspiration but is so easily overwhelmed by our preparations for Christmas. To try to rescue Advent, here are some old and new prayer suggestions that can be used when Christmas preparations get the better of Advent - and us. We remember those less fortunate than we are, and those who can't enjoy the angels' song of peace to God's people.

THE FIRST WEEK OF ADVENT: CHRISTMAS DECORATIONS

Light out of darkness is the Advent theme as we prepare for the coming light of Christ at Christmas. On dark, wintry nights, we cheer ourselves by decorating a tree with lights, so:

Almighty God, give us grace to cast away the works of darkness and to put on the armour of light now in the time of this mortal life in which your Son Jesus Christ came to visit us in great humility; that on the last day when he shall come in his glorious majesty to judge the living and the dead, we may rise to the life immortal; through him who is alive and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

THE SECOND WEEK OF ADVENT: CHRISTMAS CARDS

Christmas cards serve many purposes, from giving us an opportunity for an annual exchange, to communicating our heartfelt greetings to our closest family and friends, so:

Almighty God, through our exchange of greetings we thank you for the friendships we share with one another; help us to see in them the love you share with us - the love so deep that you sent us your Son to bring us to eternal life with you; bless us and those to whom we send greetings, that in giving

THE DEAN WRITES

Now that December is here I have been reflecting on 2023. It has been a year which has brought many blessings to us in Saint Patrick's Cathedral and for which we are thankful to Almighty God. Numbers of worshippers and visitors have been strong and comparable to the best years of 2018 and 2019. Our rationale of daily worship is our lifeblood, and, coupled with the influx of visitors from across the world to learn of the history of Saint Patrick's, together with those who come along for extra-mural events, there is a vibrancy and enthusiasm within the ancient setting.

We are blessed with an extremely efficient and competent team in Saint Patrick's, and I extend my deepest thanks to every member of staff and volunteer. It is extremely encouraging that the amount owing on the roof appeal is diminishing, and I thank sincerely all who have given donations. There have been many other significant developments which have been extremely welcome – the refurbishment of the Dean's Robing Room, major improvements to the staff canteen, the updating of the PA system, and the live stream – and more besides.

Rosemary and I are most grateful for the major work which is being carried out on the Deanery: the installation of a brand-new central heating system, the refurbishment of the windows (five of which, including the glass, date from

around 1780), and the correction of a tilt in the main staircase. This is very deeply appreciated indeed.

On all fronts, we look forward to the opportunities, and indeed the challenges, of 2024, and particularly in terms of development, to the refurbishment of the Deanery Mews which will provide a much-needed reception area and other facilities for Cathedral events, and also to the completion of the projects under the auspices of the Dean's Gift Day.

Thank you for your tremendous dedication and commitment. Trusting you will have a pleasant and relaxing break over the holiday time. May you have a happy, blessed, and peaceful Christmas. Every good wish for 2024.

THE ADMINISTRATOR WRITES

2023 has been a unique year here in Saint Patrick's Cathedral. We have recorded our highest total of visitors to date, with the total for the full year 2019 passed by the end of October. There have also been several initiatives which have either begun, or gained momentum, over the year. Two new groups, drawn from our staff, the interpretation committee and conservation committee, have undertaken most impressive work over the year. They draw on external expertise, as well as the skills from amongst their members, and feed their suggestions and findings to the Board through the fabric committee. Many significant improvements to the visitor experience have been delivered together with a new regime of conservation and care of our precious artefacts. My thanks to them all for their tremendous work.

Our oral history project, curated by Dr Deirdre Nutall of UCD, continued this year with the memories of over 60 members of the Cathedral community recorded to date. These wonderful recordings will be preserved digitally in UCD for posterity and will no doubt be of immense interest to social historians in the years to come.

Considerable work to the fabric of our historic buildings took place in 2023 with the long promised upgrades to the staff canteen finally taking place. My sincere thanks to my colleagues for their patience with this. The Dean very kindly has permitted the Lay Vicars to robe in his robing room, which was the

kindly has permitted the Lay Vicars to robe in his robing room, which was the key to allowing the project to proceed. The parts to repair the Cathedral sound system finally arrived in the country from Japan this autumn allowing the system to be repaired, delivering a significant improvement in sound quality.

Critical work to the Deanery have also occurred particularly to the windows which were in a very poor state of repair and to the staircase which had begun to sag ominously.

The Mews project, which will deliver state of the art chorister tuition areas and a new multipurpose community space, was granted planning permission in the latter half of the year. We have worked with the architect, archaeologist, quantity surveyors and other professionals to bring this project to the tendering stage. We hope to go the market with this project in the very near future. This project will facilitate the life of the Church in many important ways and we hope now to begin the work on site this spring.

Thanks, as always, are due to the staff and volunteers of Saint Patrick's Cathedral who are the ones responsible for the positive outcomes we have experienced this year. Our shop and welcome desk performed magnificently in 2023. In addition our visitors were met with a warm welcome throughout the year, which is what makes all the difference. A very Happy Christmas to our congregation, staff volunteers and clergy and see you all in the New Year!

SAFEGUARDING TRUST PANEL - VACANCY

KNIGHT AT THE MUSEUM

That headline would be funny, had we moved any of the Knights of Saint Patrick items around... But we didn't.

On the night of 16th November 2023, under the cover of darkness, a number of items in the Cathedral were moved around or removed from display.

What is known as the 'Swift Case' has been moved into the South Transept. However, Swift items have remained in the existing Swift area. We have displayed his death masks and the cast of his skull in a glass case by his grave, which is a huge improvement in accessibility for those wanting to see these items. A number of other Swift-related things (including his snuff box, books, chalice, and rush lamp) are in another glass case beneath his bust.



You will also spot that we have moved his pulpit and communion table around a bit: his pulpit is one bay further west, and his communion table is against the south wall underneath Ovenden's memorial. This means that, on guided tours, it no longer goes Swift-Presidents-Swift, but just Presidents-Swift. All of Swift's items are in one area now.

All of the glass cases in the North Aisle and North Choir Aisle have been moved into the South Transept. This is to create a dedicated exhibition space (like we had with the Cathedral's copes and chasubles) in the South Transept and move the random items out of the other areas of the Cathedral. The silverware case is now over by



Marsh's monument; the music case has been moved to the stone statue of Saint Patrick; the display with random Guinness books and BCPs has been removed; and the case with wax matrices and the William and Mary patent has been removed, with some items being moved into the old Swift Case. The silverware and music case - along-side the old Swift Case - will form part of a rotating suite of exhibitions for the South Transept, displaying a good number of different items throughout the year from 2024.

This has greatly reduced the clutter in the Cathedral and assists in providing a fluid narrative for our visitors, rather than simply displaying things for the sake of displaying them. Items removed from public view are being stored safely both on- and off-site.

With the old Swift Case now in the South Transept, this will be used to display Cathedral identity and liturgical items (which should be seen from one angle, rather than 360 degrees like the glass cases). At the moment, there are a number of wax seals and seal presses, and medals on display; there are also two large seals from the railings on display; and there are four commemorative silver plates from a 1970s restoration. I hope that eventually the rear of the old Swift Case will house a television for use by school groups using the South Transept for workshops and also additional interpretation in that area.

The wooden statue of Saint Patrick has been moved to the stone statue and stained glass window depictions of Patrick, so that we have three visual depictions of him in one place. We will be rethinking the location of the old wooden chairs in the South Transept to try and clear that clutter too.

The first phase of all this moving was the planning. The second phase was the moving! The final phase is the production of new plaques for each of the items on display in a good quality Cathedral-branded way. So over the next few weeks, we will have new plaques made and installed for all of these items. I hope you enjoy the new layout to the exhibition items. My thanks go to the Interpretation Committee and the team who helped me move all the things around last night: Aaron, John R, Laura, Kryzel, Louis, Patrick, and Ivan.

ANNUAL SERVICE OF THE IRISH ASSOCIATION OF CHANGE RINGERS

Members of The Irish Association of Change Ringers travelled from many parts of Ireland for their annual service which took the form of Choral Evensong in Saint Patrick's Cathedral on Sunday 22nd October. The preacher was the Dean of Ross, the Very Reverend Cliff Jeffers, who is very involved with bell ringing. In his most interesting sermon, Dean Jeffers referred to the centenary, back in February this year, of the death of the very distinguished Mr Richard Cherry, who gave long and devoted service to the Tower as an instructor in the art of bell ringing, as President of the Society of Change Ringers, and was the most generous donor in 1909 of two treble bells which made 12 bell ringing possible at Saint Patrick's for the first time. Richard Cherry, whose memory, and that of his wife, Mary, is immortalised by a wall tablet in the Baptistery, was a lawyer, and he had the distinction of serving as Lord Chief Justice of Ireland.

Many members of the Cherry family attended the service and later visited the Cherry grave in the old St George's graveyard in Drumcondra.
