THE DEAN WRITES... The Very Revd Dr William Morton



was an enormous honour and privilege to share in the choir trip to New York City at the end of last month. I wish to thank most sincerely Stuart Nicholson, Master of the Music; David Leigh, the Organist & Assistant Master of the Music; and the Choristers for their superb music and singing in the concert in Saint Patrick's Cathedral, Fifth Avenue, at Choral Evensong later that day in Saint Thomas's Church close-by, and at the final Evensong in the Cathedral Church of Saint John the Divine, before our homeward journey. The latter is said to be the largest gothic cathedral in the world; its sheer size together with its glorious acoustic provided an unforgettable experience in

terms of music and sound.

Among the many favourable comments received was one from Dr Kent Tritle, Director of Music at Saint John the Divine, who said to me, 'It is such a joy to have your choristers with us. They are superbly trained and they sound brilliant.'

It was undoubtedly the trip of a lifetime, one which the choristers – and indeed all of us – will never forget. We received a warm welcome everywhere throughout the trip, and our deepest thanks must go to the Rector and staff of Saint Thomas's Church for putting on a delightful reception for the group following Evensong.

Our Administrator and CEO – Gavan – and I hosted a lunch for around twenty tourism stakeholders and Gavan delivered an excellent presentation on what Saint Patrick's Cathedral has to offer the visitor.

I am confident that there will be a fruitful outcome for us in terms of increasing visitor numbers. I am most grateful to Gavan, and to Ed Coleman, our Marketing Officer, for organising the tourism meetings.

Sincere thanks as well to Stuart for the huge amount of work he expended on planning and preparing for the trip, and to all who contributed to its marvellous success.

THE ADMINISTRATOR WRITES...

Mr Gavan Woods

ommunity is at the heart of everything we do at Saint Patrick's. For us – the National Cathedral - the community includes schools congregation, and our visitors. Community also includes the population around us, whom we can reach and support through our work here. At present we are recruiting a Community Officer to spearhead this engagement and to liaise with the Dean, Clergy and staff to grow our community and to support those organisations who work to support others.

Elsewhere in this edition you will read of the Education Department's plans to increase engagement with Cathedral. Their plans will enable us to bring the disadvantaged to us and help us to have a greater presence in the community both in the city centre and further afield. You will also read details of the recent trip by our choristers to New York. The visit was a tremendous success and the children, under the direction of Stuart Nicholson, were truly wonderful. The Dean and I took advantage of the trip to raise the profile of the Cathedral with the Tourism Ireland office there, the Irish Consulate and key tour operators. In 2023 we welcomed 576,000 paying visitors to the Cathedral 46% of whom were from North America. This is a critical market for us and, thanks to the support of Tourism Ireland, we were able to reach operators with the capacity to bring substantial numbers of visitors to us. We were particularly anxious to highlight the wide range of experiences on offer here, including verger tours, venue hire etc. and I am pleased to report that our presentations were met with great interest.

Looking to the year ahead, our focus will be commencing the Mews project. As previously mentioned, this will be transformative for the Cathedral and will significantly improve the tuition areas available for our choristers in addition to providing a multi-use space that will much used by our Education and Community Departments. Our work on sustainability continues. This year we are again measuring our scope 1, 2, and 3 greenhouse gas emissions and will compare them to those recorded for 2019, hopefully highlighting reductions over the period. We are still actively exploring a partnership of scale here in Ireland which will allow us to mitigate some of the harm done, through emissions, by our visitor and events operation and I will keep you posted on any developments in the coming months.


Monday 18th March 2024 | 10:00, 12:00, 14:00 Family Workshop: Wool Felting

CHORISTERS IN NYC

ur trip of a lifetime began very early on the Thursday morning at Dublin Airport. With the rather daunting prospect of getting eighteen children through security and also USA pre-clearance, we arrived well in advance of our flight. Taking no chances we came loaded with a tonne of paperwork, including consent forms, visa waivers (better known as ESTAs), and letters from the Dean on the very finest Cathedral headed paper, just to prove we were very much all together.

As an added precaution, we were all dressed in emerald green hoodies with 'Saint Patrick's Cathedral Choristers NYC Tour 2024' emblazoned across the front. As it was, they didn't bat an eyelid and we slipped through without incident in record time. Seven-and-a-bit hours of flight later, we arrived in New York's JFK Airport. We were whisked off to our hotel, which happened to be Manhattan's tallest hotel, much to the delight of some and the dismay of others. With daylight fast fading, we had time for a brief runaround in the conveniently-located Central Park, before heading off to dinner at Romano's Pizzeria, before calling it a night.

The next day was by far the busiest of the tour. After breakfast, we dashed off to Times Square for a little souvenir shopping before heading to Saint Thomas' Church on Fifth Avenue (home to the USA's only remaining Choir School) for a brief rehearsal followed by a procession - dressed in our blue cassocks - a few blocks down to neighbouring Saint Patrick's Cathedral for our lunchtime recital. For those of you who have never visited Saint Patrick's, though huge, it is rather dwarfed by its colossal neighbours. It is only when you enter that you realise quite how big it really is. As rehearsal time in the building wasn't an option, the choristers launched straight into their lunchtime recital, and magnificent they were. Following lunch in a wellknown chain of burger restaurants (without robes this time), it was back to St Thomas' to rehearse for Evensong. Music for this service included settings of the responses and canticles written by former sub-organist of Saint Patrick's Cathedral Dublin, Timothy Noon, and an arrangement of the American hymn, 'How can I keep from singing' by former organist of Saint Thomas' (and incidentally also a former boss of mine), John Scott, who sadly died a few years back. The long day finished as it began in Times Square to see the lights and more



importantly a well-earned visit to Krispy Kreme.

Saturday was a day free of singing, largely, and instead was set aside for sightseeing with some of the best weather of the tour to boot, albeit a little chilly! We began with a trip up to the viewing platform on the 87th floor of the Empire State Building, gazing across the Manhattan skyline towards the Hudson and beyond, before heading via the subway to see the Statue of Liberty. After a brief stop to grab some of New York's famous hot dogs, corn dogs (whatever they may be), and pretzels, we began our journey back to the hotel via Ground Zero and the 9/11 Memorial. In four very hectic days, it was the one time that the entire group was silent, and with

good reason.

Our last day began again with a little more shopping - including the world-famous toy store, FAO Schwarz before packing up the coach and heading off to our third and final venue. The Cathedral of Saint John the Divine although unfinished by some margin - is the largest gothic cathedral in the world, and therefore not a bad place to finish. We were joined in the stalls by the choir and choristers of Saint John's, numbering over seventy singers, and quite some noise it was too. Despite a very busy few days, our choristers more than held their own in this massive space and its more than eight-second acoustic, singing alongside the less experienced choristers of Saint John's. One quick photo of the massed choirs after evensong and we were off back in the coach to JFK to catch our overnight flight. Thankfully security was equally kind to us on our return and we passed through without incident and with plenty of time for a little duty-free shopping for the choristers and some much-needed refreshments for the staff.

Just short of six hours of flight later, we all landed safe and sound at 8am in Dublin, sadly not quite enough time to be back in time for Matins, but I doubt any of us would have been much use by then. A big thank you must go to David Leigh for playing so brilliantly throughout; Judith, Caroline, to Catherine, and Roisin our supervisors who, along with the choristers, clocked up quite a few miles during our visit; to our hosts, in particular, Mark at Saint Patrick's, Nicolas, Jeremy, Margaret, and Lizzette at Saint Thomas', and Kent and

Bryan at Saint John's for their wonderful welcome; to Clive and Ann for guiding us around the Big Apple; and finally to you, the members of the Cathedral Community, for your generosity and support, making this truly a trip to remember.

TOURISM IRELAND IN NYC



hen people hear the job title 'Saint Patrick's Cathedral Education Officer', people in the outside world usually assume that I work in some way with the Cathedral Schools. Although I do work with them (with a different hat on), it usually comes as a surprise to many just how varied and unusual the work of the Education Department is inside the Cathedral itself, especially in a cathedral as busy and exciting as ours. Of the hundreds

of thousands of our visitors, many of them take for granted the interpretation offered in dozens of languages when they look around at the myriad of artefacts on display; many of them will take a guided tour, offered by one of the hundreds of registered volunteers, or listen to an audio guide; perhaps some will bring school groups and do a workshop; some are adult learners or recently arrived in Ireland, learning about our shared culture and heritage; and some come for the major themed events throughout the year, such as Heritage Week or Culture Night. All of this requires a huge amount of teamwork across the whole Cathedral. with more work going on in the background than most imagine. From the Conservation and the Interpretation Committees, to this year's Heritage Week Planning Group and the Workshop Facilitators Collaboration Meetings, so many people feed into the work of the Education Department throughout the year, and to them I offer them my thanks. Without their support and ideas, my wild plans would never come to fruition. So this is my request to you: explore, and explore differently. If you're new here or if you've been here for a long time, discover a new aspect of this Cathedral: bring a school group, go on a guided tour, become a volunteer, or engage with a community project. My hope for 2024 is that we will enable more people to do more things with CDJBus.

DR DAVID O'SHEA'S BOOK LAUNCH

Tuesday 27th February 2024 saw the launch of Dr David O'Shea's latest publication, *The Choral Foundation of the Chapel Royal*, *Dublin Castle* in the Lady Chapel after Evensong. O'Shea conducted the Cathedral Consort at Evensong, featuring demonstrative music. The book, which is based on O'Shea's PhD thesis, investigates the Chapel's constitution, liturgy, and music through an examination of previously unexplored primary material. The choral foundation is brought to life with accounts of the

Chapel's clergy, organists, boy choristers, and gentleman singers, which provide insights into Dublin's social history during a period of significant change.

O'Shea has been Organist of Sandford Parish Church and St Philip's Milltown in South Dublin, and he deputises regularly at the Cathedral as an organist and singer.
