

THE DEAN WRITES...

THE VERY REVD DR WILLIAM MORTON

mong my earliest memories of being brought to church those around harvest thanksgiving services. I still recall the familiar sights and smells of harvest: the sheaves of corn, the vegetables, the flowers, the bread and the grapes, and on it goes! Harvest can be a powerful reminder of our dependence on the natural world and cycles of planting, growth and gathering, with each stage involving its particular combinations of human endeavour, patience and dependence on conditions outside of our control. Theologically we're reminded that nothing grows without the seed that falls into the earth and dies so that it might yield a rich harvest.

In later life, and certainly following ordination, I began to think of harvest in an additional way. In the different settings in which I found myself ministering, services of thanksgiving for harvest, while reflecting some of the above dimensions, began to focus on what was the connection and way of life specific to that parish and to that area. For example, in County Donegal, in the Parish of Dunfanaghy, where I was invited to preach at harvest a few times over the years, there would have been an emphasis on location, in terms of that for which we were thanking God. In addition to the harvest of the land, and all the symbols of God's bounty, there were also lobster pots, and fishing nets

on display, and beautiful illustrations by children in the local national school of the harvest of the sea.

Similarly, on moving to a civic environment in Derry/Londonderry, there was an emphasis on industry and commerce, about manufacture, and factories, and the employment created for local people. With the passing years, I reckon I have come to recognise a 'here and now' element of an urban harvest that relates more particularly to our experience and context. Harvest can be a festival of place, connecting us with where we live and the people who live and work in our place: in other words, the work of human hands and hearts as well as the fruits of the earth. What this, in essence, amount to is this. Harvest can also connect us with the Lord who


is here, whose Spirit is with us.

It is really a case of beginning to discover the fruits of wherever one is, and where one is glad to be. Thomas Merton, who was a monk, writer, theologian, mystic, poet, social activist and scholar of comparative religion, said this: "It is essential to experience all the times and moods of one good place." Harvest, in fact like any other time in the Church's year, or in the calendar, is about gratitude, celebration, and enjoyment of encounter with God, his presence, and his gifts.

In thanksgiving for all God's bounty, and in the hope of utilising his gifts to the full for his greater glory.



THE ADMINISTRATOR WRITES...

Mr Gavan Woods

s I write the final details of the contract for the Mews Community Hub project are being finalised. We hope to issue a letter of intent within a few days with the contractor, Kelbuild, to begin on site about a fortnight later.

Separately to the main work we were lucky to secure a Built Heritage Investment Scheme grant to reinstate the old arch above the stable door in the east front of the building. This can be clearly seen in the drawing below from a refurbishment project that occurred in the 1940s. Under the terms of this grant we had to have the work complete by the beginning of September. Fionnuala, of Howley Hayes Cooney Architects, developed the drawings for the project with the stonemasons from Conservation and Restoration undertaking the work.

You will see from the accompanying photographs that this work, using traditional methods and materials, was executed the highest


standards. Reinstating this original feature had given life to the facade of what is a plain but attractive and well-proportioned building.

I made several visits during the course of the work and it was a pleasure to see the arch develop. The knowledge of the stonemasons and their use of brick, stone and mortar to deliver both strength and form was most impressive. The section of wall above the arch was removed to facilitate the work and then rebuilt when the arch was complete, with the upper facade and internal floor supported on jacks throughout the work. These will be removed completely when the lime mortar has set and everything is secure in a week or two.

Our thanks to the architect, engineer and stonemasons for delivering this small but worthwhile and impactful project!

An Appreciation...

Ifirst met Mira Maini when the Honourable Rory Guinness brought her to Dublin for a visit. Rory's "new" girlfriend was a stunningly attractive young lady whom everyone admired and with whom everyone felt at ease. Sometime later, Rory phoned me to say they had become engaged and he was the happiest man in the world!

Roll on a couple of years and I had the great pleasure to conduct their marriage in Elveden estate, and then later to baptise their first two children, Aoife and Beatrice, and then to be their son Aidan's godfather. We kept in touch over the last 19 years or so watching the children grow up and Mira being such a wonderful loving mother and devoted wife.

I was devasted when Rory contacted me to tell me that Mira had died and that her wish was that I was to conduct her funeral service along with Dean Morton. The dean, my wife Denise and I travelled to Wilbury estate on the night before Mira's funeral to spend some time with Rory, Aoife, Bea and Aidan as well as Mira's parents, Tidu and Meta and her sister Maya and brother Zubin.

On Tuesday 19th September hundreds of people gathered inside and outside the local St Andrew's Church, Newton Toney for her funeral and celebration of a young life so fully lived. This was followed by a reception back at Wilbury where over four hundred people from all walks of life gathered to share stories about Mira and to reflect on her life and achievements.

Some words from the sermon that day: "As a grieving community, we

have gathered here this morning to share with the Guinness and Maini families and especially with Rory, Aoife, Bea and Aidan in their sad loss and to pay our own personal respects to Mira, whose life was all too short.

"As Christians, we live by faith, walk in faith and die in faith. But for those left behind when death strikes, what little comfort we gain comes from our faith and the hope of resurrection that we will meet again those loved ones who have died. When human comfort cannot help, how marvellous it is to have faith in Christ who has prepared many mansions for us for endless and blessed peace with him and our loved ones in heaven.

"We will miss Mira for so many different reasons, but her immediate family will miss her most. And so to Rory, Aoife, Bea and Aidan: her parents, Meta and Tidu as well as sister and brother, Maya and Zubin and their families we extend our deepest sympathies and remind you all of the words of Saint John's Gospel, "Jesus said, 'Do not let your hearts be troubled: and do not be afraid."

"We thank God for the privilege of knowing and loving such a beautiful, lovely young lady as Mira Guinness. And so, as God gave her to us, so now we give her back to God, for the souls of the righteous are in the hands of God.

"A young life so fully lived, it was and is a privilege to know you. Mira was as good as she was beautiful.

"May she Rest in Peace and Rise in Glory. Amen."

BERNARD SAWIER CELEBRATES 90 YEARS

If someone without any knowledge of Saint Patrick's was given the challenge of finding the name 'Sawier' in the Cathedral, they would not face an easy task! That's because it's not to be found prominently on a large monument or wall tablet. In very small and fine engraved lettering, it is to be found on some of the brass plaques or plates, towards a bottom corner.

While the engraved letters may be small, there is a huge significance and history in the name, because it refers to a Master Engraver, Charles Sawier. The story goes back even further than that, however, in that Charles's father, William, also in the same line of craftsmanship, created the brass plates marking the graves of Dr Jonathan Swift and his beloved friend Esther (Stella) Johnston. Some of Charles's expert work is to be found also in prestigious locations across the world.

Over my eight years as Dean it has been a privilege to welcome Bernard and his family to the Cathedral several times to re-trace his father's steps, and to explain to his children and grandchildren the quality work of this Master Engraver.

I was delighted to learn that

earlier this year Bernard had accepted our invitation to come in and record with Deirdre Nuttall from UCD some of his reminiscences as part of our oral history project. Not only this! Bernard's family asked if they could bring him back in July, when his son, Justin, and one of his daughters, was home from Chicago to celebrate Bernard's 90th birthday. It would be an occasion for a tour of the Cathedral and also to visit the Deanery for a quick tour there too.

Aware of Bernard's birthday on that very day, I had a birthday cake and candles, and a few other edible fancies(!) at the ready! Here I have to let the reader into a little secret! It was my birthday too – of which Bernard was unaware until he arrived!

In the course of a very enjoyable afternoon, Bernard reminisced about some of the stories told him by his father who was a chorister in Saint Patrick's Cathedral. His training with the Cathedral organist of the day, Dr Charles Marchant, instilled in him a tremendous love of music in that he was later to be appointed Choirmaster of St Kevin's Church, and was also a founder member, with 'Maestro Viani', of the Dublin Operatic Society. Interestingly, he was also to use his tremendous skills with brass later in life to create a fitting memorial in the Cathedral to the late Dr Marchant.

Bernard said that his late father absolutely adored his work, especially when it involved the life of his beloved Saint Patrick's. Referring to the various brass plaques – including the List of Deans – which his father had created, Bernard also spoke about the brass memorial which his mother had erected

in memory of his father, Charles. It is of brass, on black marble, and the inscription reads: 'Designed and executed by Charles George Sawier 1884-1973, Master Engraver of this city. Examples of his excellent work can be seen in this Cathedral. Erected by his loving wife, Elsie. 'I thank my God upon every remembrance of you.'

Bernard's is blessed with a very lucid recall of the history of the Cathedral. He considers this a real gift. He mentioned as well that he has a collection of tools which were used to make these beautiful pieces of art work.

It was a very enjoyable celebration of Bernard's 90th birthday and he and his family left absolutely delighted. It was a birthday they will never forget!

I'm BACK!

So, the adventures of covidlife interrupted the flow of community engagement to a huge extent. Once laid-off due to the pandemic, I had the privilege of working with our nearest neighbours in the not-for-profit sector—The Iveagh Trust. This was hugely important work as they chose to support three of the ongoing initiatives that began when I was community officer in the Cathedral up to the lay-off. Those projects were:

• CRiTiCall (Community Response Team Call) partnering with beneficiary organisation, Safe Ireland, and collaborators: Dublin City Volunteer Centre, The Iveagh Trust, An Garda Síochána, Serve the City Dublin to provide essential supplies and support to families experiencing domestic abuse.

- A food distribution scheme sourced from FoodCloud and supported by a number of programmes and organisations to help families struggling to put food on the table.
- Ongoing interagency work in relation to the Cabbage Garden of which the Iveagh Trust are a critical partner.

In April 2023, I commenced as Pioneer Evangelist in the Kildare Centre of Mission based at Saint Brigid's Cathedral, Kildare Town. The role was part-sponsored by Church Army UK & Ireland and the Meath and Kildare Diocesan Council, with Rev Philip McKinley as Lead Evangelist. While there, I engaged with the congregation and local community to extend the mission of the Church to the local community. Throughout the time there, it was a very significant year of celebration marking not only 800 years

of the current construction, but also 1500 years since the death of Saint Brigid. This was a great opportunity to work in a small community who have very similar presentation of needs to the capital city, yet with much smaller scope and resources to combat the challenges abounding. I had continued my relationship with Saint Patrick's as a volunteer steward, and that ensured me keeping in contact with the colleagues I have so much respect and care for.

Since returning to Saint Patrick's, I have resumed my role as Designated Liaison Person for Child and Adult Safeguarding. Relationships have been rekindled with key agencies such as the Child and Family Support Network, local Social Work Teams and so on. As a result of Clark not being in post, we needed a driver for the minibus and I was supported to undertake lessons, and I successfully did the test in August.

The first group to experience me as a driver are from the Cathedral the furthest away from Saint Patrick's in the lovely southwest of Cork – Saint Fachtna's in Roscarberry. The Very Rev Cliff Jeffers 25th Dean of St Fachtna's Cathedral, arranged for 15 parishioners and current Curate – Michael Kinney to travel with us to Saint Patrick's Cathedral. En route we stopped off at the Horse & Jockey, and Saint Brigid's Cathedral Kildare where we dined in the Silken Thomas before continuing to Dublin. The group split in 2 with one being hosted by Derek McEndoo and Dean Jeffers to the bellringing room and higher roof spaces as well as the top of the Minot Tower.

Meantime, I kept my feet firmly on the ground with the visitors who remained for the ground floor experience. All attended Evening Prayer, said by the Dean's Vicar, Canon Charles Mullen, who was very welcoming and spent time with the visiting pilgrims. Colette and John, two of our Vergers ensured all was in order for our tea in the south transept which sustained the group in their evening enjoyment at the Gaiety where they attended the Riverdance experience.



The group were then whisked away to the CITI College for a restful night. Day 2 involved breakfast and Morning Prayer before departing for Carlow Arboretum. A quick coffee stop, and we were on the road again to Saint Carthage's beautiful Cathedral in Lismore, County Waterford. We were back in Roscarberry in nice time for the Dean to host his Vestry meeting! It has been a busy few weeks, and I have not only been to the southern-most point, but also the northern-most! St Columb's in Derry have been hosting an exhibition which began as a result of a talk I gave last Spring on Saint Brigid. At the time, a wonderfully curated collection of 'cloaks' made of homegrown, hand spun, handdyed wool from around Ireland was on display in St Brigid's Cathedral, Kildare Town. Since the talk, Vestry members were inspired about the potential for them to host the cloaks as the Ulster representative group and to their credit, they not only hosted the 4 pieces which are symbolic of communities across the

4 provinces, they expanded to display cloaks from all walks of life including from our very own collections of Dean's robes! The community saw more than 15,000 people from over 59 countries visit the Cathedral and engage with the exhibit, the space and the people they met. I was thrilled to be there when a Cloak created by 125 members of the community was presented at a service if celebration followed by a reception and social gathering. The exhibition has been extended until mid-September, so if you can, it's definitely worth seeing. We await news on where the exhibition might travel in Munster and Connacht next! (Maybe even further afield!)

Another exciting development is a project spearheaded by Detective Chief Supt Brian Woods who has partnered with Belvedere Youth Club. We have supported the work with a donation towards kit costs for a group of young people engaged with The Gateway Life Skills Project. This transformational, global youth leadership engagement





project has seen a group of dynamic young people travel to the town of Pyla - a town which is home to Greek, Cypriot, Turkish and UN Peacekeepers! A global crossroads opportunity for everyone involved. Some photos are included and a more detailed insight will follow once the group return to Ireland. We hope to host a group of young men and women from Pyla soon.

Since returning to Saint Patrick's Cathedral, I've been supported to see through some initiatives commenced at Saint Brigid's Cathedral prior to my One such occasion took departure. place last Saturday August 31st when Niamh Strong headlined a concert hosted by Kildare Centre of Mission in aid of Kildare's only refuge for women and children fleeing domestic abuse in its many forms. Also performing were members of Newbridge Gospel Choir under the direction of Lisa Nagle and Mairead Carroll from Newbridge town who is a traditional musician and singer. A group of 10 transition year graduates supported the running of the event with setting up, stewarding, safety planning and take down. They had successfully participated in a programme of training with Kildare Centre of Mission in the academic year 23/24 as TY students and Gaisce Bronze candidates.

In other news, the distribution of the community fund will commence at the end of September with an online application system for consideration, remaining open until November 1st. In the next edition of Close News, we will have more updates on the progression of community engagement.
