

THE DEAN WRITES...

THE VERY REVD DR WILLIAM MORTON

utumn is well and truly upon us, heralding October as a month of change. The light fades more quickly, the evenings draw in, and the colours of the leaves remind us both of the beauty of creation and of the passage of time. Even in the heart of the city—where leaves fall not into meadows but on to pavements, and where the hum of traffic replaces the rustle of hedgerows—the rhythm of the seasons still makes itself felt.

Traditionally, this is the time of harvest thanksgiving. Though few of us now gather crops or fill barns, we depend nonetheless upon the fruits of the earth and the labour of those who tend and harvest them. In giving thanks, we acknowledge

not only our daily bread but also our shared responsibility for one another, particularly those who live with scarcity rather than plenty.

October is also a month of special commemorations in the life of the Cathedral. At Choral Evensong on the first three Sundays there is a special 'designation' or focus to the worship. On Sunday 5th, we commemorate the Huguenots, who, forced to flee their native France owing to the revocation by Louis XIV of the Edict of Nantes, came to Dublin and worshipped in the Lady Chapel, contributing their gifts and talents to the industry and life of this city. Then on Sunday 12th October, some of the Past Choristers of Saint Patrick's will

lend voice by joining the Choir in the stalls to give thanks for the rich choral tradition stretching back over several centuries. On Sunday 19th October, we commemorate the life and ministry of the late Dr Jonathan Swift, Dean of Saint Patrick's from 1713-1745. As we plan ahead for worship in this way, we are reminded that we are part of a story much larger than our own, one that continues to be written here in Saint Patrick's.


And then, as the month turns, November invites us into

remembrance—of saints, of souls, of all who have gone before us. The falling leaves and shortening days prompt us to think of our own mortality, but also of the hope we share: that in Christ life is stronger than death, and love endures.

May this season of thanksgiving and remembrance be for us all a time of reflection, gratitude, and renewed faith.

he completion and hand over date for the Mews is scheduled for 4 December. Though I would not be so rash as to schedule an event in the building for the 5th, I am happy to report that the project is progressing well, and we are very hopeful we will have the Mews in use before Christmas.

The quality of the contractor's work is first class, and we are confident the Mews will be a beautiful as well as functional space for the Cathedral community to use and enjoy.

We have appointed a new finance manager in the office who is due to start with us on 20 October; more details to follow shortly. This role is a key element of our plan to ensure that we maintain our strong record of transparency, prudence, and good governance in financial matters as we encounter the opportunities and challenges that the future will undoubtedly bring us.

Finally a word about the busy summer season now drawing to a close. Record visitor figures were attained this summer with a figure of 96,000 visitors recorded for August; the first time we have breached the 90,000 mark in the Cathedral's history in a single month. Obviously this is positive news though it is important to highlight the tireless work of my colleagues, particularly at the welcome desk and marketing teams, reflected in these results. I hope the quieter period ahead will allow time for all to recover and regroup as we approach Christmas and the end of the year.



FOUR FRIENDS, TWO CATHEDRALS, ONE EXTRAORDINARY JOURNEY

England, friends from members of the Church - Sam, AJ, Alan, Kevin - attended the early Eucharist on Sunday 7th September after which, as they explained, they were embarking on an ambitious plan - to walk from Saint Patrick's Cathedral, Dublin, to Saint David's Cathedral in Wales, retracing the footsteps of Saint Aidan. Geared up, and enthused, they promised to keep in touch - and they did! Sam has written: "We experienced God's presence conversations, hospitality, prayer, and creation. Challenges, surprises, and friendships deepened the journey. Linking both cathedrals, we felt welcomed, refreshed, and inspired to strengthen Irish-Welsh pilgrimage bonds."

In describing their undertaking, the four said they wished it to be of benefit both spiritually and physically. After the event, Kevin also referred to the challenge of the walk, the natural beauty of their route, and their unforgettable encounters of generosity and faith. "Amid rain and hard walking, God's call became clear: to leave architectural practice and discern ordained ministry. The journey offered reflection, hope, and conviction to share Christ's light in today's searching world," he stated.

Incidentally, Saint David's is known as the smallest city in the UK – both by size and population (just over 1,600 residents). In medieval times it was a major pilgrimage site: two pilgrimages to Saint David's were considered equal to one to Rome, and three were equal to one to Jerusalem.

As I understand it from our four friends, Saint David's Cathedral has on its staff a pilgrimage officer who assists and supports individuals and groups who visit the historic site.


HERITAGE ON TAP: NEW BOOK UNVEILS THE GUINNESS STORY

he Dean was delighted to be invited to the launch of Guinness: A Family Succession, the hot off the press book by the 4th Earl of Iveagh, Arthur Edward Guinness, 'the true story of the struggle to create the world's largest brewery.' The launch took place in the former Guinness family home at 80 Saint Stephen's Green which now houses The Department of Foreign Affairs.

The large number in attendance, representing various strands of civic life, heard Lord Iveagh describe how the book came about: 'As head of the Guinness family, I've always been fascinated by the lives of my ancestors, these personalities who

in four generations took Guinness from nothing to the largest brewery in the world. I feel it's time to tell the true story.'

Published by Scala Arts & Heritage Publishers, Ltd., Great Ormonde Street, London, this book is described on the back cover as 'a tale of brewing genius, sibling rivalry, bounteous philanthropy and astonishing social mobility which are interwoven with historic national events, including the Act of Union, Catholic Emancipation, the Famine, the Home Rule Movement, the Dublin Lockout and ultimately Irish Independence – the inside story, as told by Ned Guinness.'

PYLA PROJECT UPDATE

are delighted that the Gateway Project is continuing its expansion with a formalisation of its status just confirmed. Springboard Northern Ireland have collaborated with The Gateway Project and a delegation is out in Pyla to mark International Day of Peace. 'The young people from Shankill and Clonard will continue their research on the impact of peace walls as societal and psychological barriers, contextualising their circumstances in Belfast. International Study is an amazing opportunity for young people to learn, connect, and develop global viewpoints on conflict and reconciliation.

Springboard has had the privilege of taking young people abroad for many years to explore grassroots peacebuilding;

it has been a fantastic tool in forming a greater picture of the world outside of Belfast! As part of its The Wall2Wall Programme, the members of the group said that they have spent their first day being welcomed into the last divided capital in Europe! They crossed peace barriers that split one community from another, something that resonates all too well with young people from Northern Ireland.

The group had a lot to think about, looking at similarities and differences from Nicosia's Green Line to our own peace wall in Belfast. As the group heard from the UN and local peace activists the question was posed;

What is the real cause of division – the walls we physically see, or the walls in our minds?' *Kelley Bermingham*

JOHN HEMINGWAY TRIBUTE EVENING

n Thursday 9th October at 7.30pm Saint Patrick's Cathedral will host a special Tribute Evening in honour of John "Paddy" Hemingway (1919–2025), the last surviving pilot of the Battle of Britain — and a former chorister of this Cathedral.

Born Rathmines, in Hemingway attended both Cathedral Choir School and Saint Andrew's College (which, in John's day, would have been situated at 21 Saint Stephen's Green) before joining the Royal Air Force in 1938. In 1940 he flew Hurricanes in the Battle of Britain. surviving being shot down four times and later receiving the Distinguished Flying Cross. His passing on Saint Patrick's Day this year, aged 105, marked the end of a remarkable generation known as "the Few."

The Tribute Evening will bring together the Cathedral Choristers and musicians from Saint Andrew's College, Blackrock to honour Group Captain Hemingway in music and word. The programme will include hymns he would have known as a boy chorister, wartime songs, and reflections from family and friends on John's courage, character, and enduring legacy.

All are warmly invited to join us for this celebration of courage, humility, and faith. Before he ever soared into the skies, John Hemingway first lifted his voice in song here at Saint Patrick's — a legacy we now remember with gratitude.




